

BY5 Early Childhood Initiative mobilizes Kindergarten readiness messaging through MITS bus advertisements





Have you read to your child today? That is just one of the questions BY5 is asking parents throughout Muncie in its recent campaign to raise awareness of the importance of Kindergarten readiness.

The campaign centers around sharing simple things parents can do each day from the time their child is born to prepare them for Kindergarten: reading, talking, singing, playing, counting, and exploring. As the campaign touts, "your child's future begins today."

In an effort to reach all parents across Muncie, BY5 took to the streets—literally—to spread its message. Interior and exterior ads on MITS buses mobilize the campaign through different corners of Muncie. These bus ads—in addition to social media posts, Facebook ads, ads, radio ads, and direct mailers—have resulted in a 42% increase in monthly website traffic since the campaign launched in September.

This positive reaction indicates that more families are learning not just about BY5, but also about

the importance of doing what they can to prepare their child for Kindergarten.

Research has shown that children who are ready for Kindergarten by age 5 are 17% more likely to graduate from high school, 4 times more likely to graduate from college, 46% more likely to have a full-time job, and 20% more likely to earn a strong salary by age 40. So, preparing your child to be ready for Kindergarten from the time they're born creates a pipeline of opportunities for the rest of their life. From a community standpoint, ensuring all children in our community are ready for Kindergarten by age 5 sets us up for a stronger economic workforce in generations to come.

This concept—connecting Kindergarten readiness to economic success—is the foundation of BY5, which serves as the leading organization for early childhood awareness in Muncie and Delaware County. As a nonprofit, BY5 works to improve opportunities for children aged 0-5 to reach their developmental potential through a number of free programs and resources, including Little Free Libraries, Little Learners Passports, book donations, free diaper banks, and more.
